CENSUS 2021

Census Day was Sunday March 21st. Every household should have completed the Census by then or shortly thereafter. The information provided helps give the best picture of the needs of everyone in England and Wales. Organisations such as Local Authorities and charities use this information to plan and budget for the services we all need, including transport, education and healthcare. If you have yet to complete the Census you need to do so. Not submitting a Census is a crime and you could be fined for not completing your return. If you need help there is a Census Support Centre at Strode College, Church Street, Street. The telephone number is 01458 844480. The centre provides phone support or face-to-face appointments.

MAKE A CHANGE - BECOME A COUNCILLOR

STC is asking you to consider becoming a local councillor. As a councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. To stand for election you must be:

- A UK or Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of the Republic of Ireland, or a citizen of a Member State of the EU.
- At least 18 year of age.
- An elector of the Somerton Town Council, or in the past 12 months occupied land or
 premises in the area Somerton Town Council services (as owner or tenant), or work in the
 area that Somerton Town Council services (as your principal or only place of work) or live
 within three miles of the Somerton Town Council boundary.

There are currently four vacancies on STC and a by-election will take place on the 6th May, alongside the election of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Avon and Somerset, if there are more candidates than vacancies. Nomination papers must be submitted by Thursday 8th April (which we realise may be around the time you are receiving this issue of the Viaduct). If you are interested in becoming a councillor at any time, as vacancies do arise outside formal elections, please look online at www.nalc.gov.uk/elections or contact the Town Clerk's office or any councillor for further information and an informal chat.

SOMERTON MUSIC AND ARTS FESTIVAL 2021

Somerton looks set to celebrate this summer following the positive news regarding the easing of restrictions by summer. The organisers of the Somerton Music and Arts have announced that the festival is to go ahead as planned, with a series of arts and music events taking place throughout the town from 3rd to 10th July. 'After a tough year for everyone, we are thrilled to be able to go ahead with a festival which provides fantastic entertainment for both the local community and for visitors from across the country' said Cliff (Fred) Bassett, Chair of Somerton Music and Arts Festival. The festival, which started in 1987, is an annual event in the historic Somerset market town; providing entertainment across the week including a family fun day, local bands, classical music, talks & workshops to name just a few. The festival culminates in a one-day music festival, Somerstock. Attracting top bands, this year's headliners are pop and soul legends The Christians. A further 14 bands will perform across three stages providing non-stop family entertainment, and a wide variety of food, bars and stalls will ensure that there's something for every taste. As well as providing entertainment, the festival raises money for charity and Fred continued, 'we look forward not only to being able to put money back into the community again but also being able to celebrate safely once more this summer.' As part of a full programme of events in the town we are pleased to announce that Simeon Wood will be returning as well as Flute Cake Trio, amongst many other exciting acts. We also have great plans for the Funday on the 4th July.

WALKING

I hope that during the lockdown you've been able to get out locally and do a bit of walking! I certainly have and one thing I have been doing is updating local walks. The Somerton Strolls - 15 walks of around 10 kilometres - originally written in 2008, have all been re-walked and updated and special thanks to Angela & David Locke for their help. I've also been checking the Somerton Strolls Sequel series - this is a much more ambitious set of ten walks starting at the Half Moon car park, each with the choice of (roughly) 20, 15, 10 or 5 kilometres. The 5 kilometre walks are also published as "Short Walks from the Half Moon car park"

Now that we're allowed to travel a bit further (from March 29th), I've also made a start on checking and revising the series "From the Bus-stop..." - each one consists of walks of about 10 kilometres, starting from a bus stop on the 54 Taunton to Yeovil route or the 77 Wells to Yeovil route. However, there are indications of where it would be possible to park a car if you're not happy to use public transport. I'm also working on a second set from the 54 route.

SPEEDWATCH

Another month and another update from SpeedWatch. We have only just started out again and want to remind you that we care about the safety of you all. Motorists, walkers and cyclists sometimes find time to wave but there are a few who only manage to greet us and wave with two fingers! At least you see us and knowing that you have been caught on the radar your reaction tells us that you are more annoyed with yourselves for being picked up and are aware that you are speeding. Fortunately, we get far more thumbs up and smiles with positive responses for taking the time to record and monitor the traffic and we are sure that most folk appreciate safer, slower traffic and take time to thank us. The SIDs which record traffic movement 24 hours a day are showing a great deal of useful data which will be used to make the roads safer.

MESSAGES FROM THE PATIENTS' PARTICIPATION GROUP (PPG)

The PPG's new email address is now active. Please contact us at ppgbhc@gmail.com Covid-19 vaccinations. The progress with rolling out the national vaccination programme is reported daily and it is good to know that priority groups are now beginning to receive their 'second doses'. As before, please wait to be contacted with an invitation to attend one of the GP-led sites. You will appreciate that the list of those due to be invited for either their first or second dose is a long one. We remain grateful to all the medical practitioners and volunteers who have ensured the mammoth task of overseeing and administering vaccinations has progressed so well thus far.

You may recall that the government's aim is for all cohorts 1-9 to have received at least the first dose of vaccine by April 30th with the target date of July 31st for all adults to have received both doses of vaccine. The latest information relating to our area is that the first target should be met comfortably and the second is achievable if supplies and staffing levels continue as present.

A cautionary note: We are aware that there are criminals harnessing the vaccination programme and using it as a way to target members of the public and tricking them into handing over cash or financial details. There are a number of ways in which this is being done including: convincing looking text messages and phoning people directly pretending to be from the NHS or from a local pharmacy. Please remember – and advise those who you feel may be vulnerable - the NHS will never: ask for payment (the vaccine is free) nor your bank details; nor will they arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccines nor ask you to prove your identity by your sending copies of your personal documents, such as your passport.

Phoning: Following the advice offered previously, it is clear some patients have now taken advantage of calling the surgery outside peak times (that is, during the afternoon). This really is a win-win as the patient usually receives a swifter response (as the queue is shorter) and pressure on busy staff is eased. BUT we do have to remind patients that staff are not able to book Covid-19 vaccination appointments over the phone; you do have to wait to be contacted.

The PPG remains keen to recruit new full members (currently there are two vacancies) and would especially welcome enquiries from those within the age bracket 20-45 and/or those with a young family. Alternatively, you can keep in touch with the PPGs activity by registering as a 'virtual' (or associate) member. To do so, contact the PPG secretary via the (new) email address – see above – and you will then receive minutes of meetings and other relevant documents. You will also be encouraged to offer comments, questions and suggestions which will then be presented at a meeting of the PPG. SOMERTON MARKET



SOMERTON LIBRARY

Subject to government Covid regulations, the library intends to expand its current 'click-andcollect' service to a limited browsing service from 12 April and, with the end of the requirement for social distancing, to resume normal service from 21 June.

Somerton Library now has its own website: www.somertonlibrary.com where details of the current service are explained. This will be updated with information about the expanded services when the details are confirmed.

The click-and-collect service includes:

Returns – all items borrowed can be placed in the boxes in the foyer. All items on loan, but not overdue, were automatically extended to at least 31st March 2021 and overdue charges are currently paused until 4th May.
